Since their marriage in 2001, Art Hampton had slowly transformed his wife from a person afraid of water to an ardent boater, initially by restoring a 1958 Chris-Craft Capri he had in storage for 34 years. The transom reads *It's Someday* because that was Nancy's favorite saying. Using the restored Capri, they were ready to travel to many boat shows, meet new people and get involved in antique boating. Aware of Nancy's life-threatening condition, Art conferred with Lou Ronco, then president of the Sunnyland Chapter who knew Nancy well, to do something special for her at the 2009 Sunnyland Boat Show

banquet, unbeknownst to Nancy. Lou called her and Art to the podium for a unique presentation. Addressing the men in the audience, Art remarked that none of them would be successful captains without the support of their wives, and he presented Nancy with an award entitled "Best First Mate." She was totally surprised and overjoyed. Sadly, a few months later Nancy passed away, but because Art is very passionate about the need to recognize "first mates," the award has lived on.

Since 2009, Art has traveled to hundreds of chapter boat shows around the Midwest and East Coast, just as Nancy would have wanted to do. His traveling partner and current first mate is their 10-year-old Jack Russell Terrier, Tater, known so well throughout ACBS chapters that he sometimes gets his own name badge at boat shows.

The Winter ACBS International Quarterly Meeting was held in conjunction with Kent Caldwell's Ft. Myers Boat Show. Overall, ACBS membership has flattened out and is trending upward. Current membership as of January 15th was

6,837 members. and we are looking for that upward trend to continue in 2016. ACBS is very sound financially, with a balance of almost \$250,000 in the capital reserve fund over and above the operating accounts and \$302,835 in the scholarship fund.

The new ACBS website is up and running. There are still a few areas that need to be tweaked, but overall the site is functioning well. If you have changes that need to be made to your membership listing, please go online and make those changes now. An increasing number of members are opting for the electronic version of the ACBS directory; over 33% of the membership opted for the electronic version in 2015. We are looking to streamline the directory in the future to eliminate the repetitive material that is now included on the new ACBS website and chapter handbook.

The committee overseeing the chapter handbook has completed the changes for the 2016 version and will be sending it out to all chapter presidents by the end of February. The handbook will probably be phased out in printed form after 2016 and made available only on the website in the future.

Several ACBS committees are working on future improvements to the ship's store, youth programs, chapter outreach and publicity/marketing strategies.
